# From the kitchen window 26<sup>th</sup> February 2021

Suddenly we have warm spring weather: the birds are singing, the crocuses flowering and things begin to seem more hopeful. We have even seen our first butterfly, a beautiful yellow Brimstone! On a long walk round Kerdiston, we were delighted to hear Skylarks singing for the first time this year. Their wonderfully uplifting song is the sound of farmland in spring, rippling down from amazing heights as they circle their chosen field, pouring out their liquid song, until at last they drop down to earth, the music stops, and they become just ordinary small brown birds. A flock of finches were feeding on a field of stubble and flying up into an adjacent line of trees at any poten-



tial threat. Most were Chaffinches but we also located four Yellowhammers with them by their 'chink-ing' calls. A few days later, I heard a cock Yellowhammer singing his 'little-bit-of-bread-andno-cheese' song from a hedge in Booton, which was a very early date. Yellowhammers are one of many species of farmland bird which have been in decline in recent years, so having one on territory in February is a hopeful sign that numbers may be on the increase again. Many farmers now sow awkward corners of fields with bird seed mix

which helps them survive the winter. Various plants were also beginning to flower in the hedge banks: Red and White Dead Nettle; the first Celandines in shady, damp spots and near a cottage, some blue Periwinkle, which had escaped from the garden. Following my note last week about the Otter prints, Mark T sent a photo he took on Friday, of an Otter looking straight at the camera while floating on the Wensum at

Sparham! Then on Tuesday he sent another photo, taken from his garden, of a Red Kite drifting overhead with a Crow in attendance, showing the Kite's long wings and deeply forked tail which it uses as a rudder, allowing it to change direction without needing to flap its wings. Following a re-introduction programme in the Chilterns, Red Kites are now widespread in East Anglia but it is still a thrill to watch their effortless mastery of the air. Do send any sightings of wildlife that you have, so we can all share them rachel.42rr@btinternet.com
