## From the kitchen window 7<sup>th</sup> May 2021

What a difference a day can make. On Friday of last week we visited a Breckland heath in the south-west of the county in warm and sunny weather and we were delighted to hear Wood Lark and Tree Pipit singing, as well as Whitethroats and other summer warblers around the scrubby edges. There were disappointingly few flowers, due to the lack of rain in April, which the current wet spell should soon alleviate. The following day it was cloudy and cold when we walked along Catchback Lane and came upon a flock of about one hundred Fieldfare spread out along a hedgerow. They were very noisy and restless, flying from perch to perch, down to the ground and back into the trees. They were ready to head off to the continent to breed, but had been held up by the northerly winds for weeks. Three days later we saw



another smaller party heading north-west over Reepham: they couldn't wait any longer and would have been working their way up the country to island hop from the Scottish mainland to Orkney to Shetland and on to Scandinavia. In early May we are usually on the lookout for the first Swifts rather than seeing the last winter visitors! At least there are now flowers in bloom in many places. Judith and Rufus, visiting Blickling Woods and

Guestwick, photographed pale lilac Lady's Smock, white racemes of Bird Cherry, magenta Early Purple Orchids and the green hooded Wild Arum. Lady's Smock is also known as Cuckoo Flower and Wild Arum, Cuckoo Pint, indicating that both are usually in flower when the first Cuckoos arrive. Sadly the call of the Cuckoo is now rarely heard in this part of Norfolk but it still can be found in the Broads and Breck. We saw Lady's Smock just opening its petals in a damp, unimproved meadow in Reepham, where leaves of one of the Spotted Orchids and Water Mint were also growing. There were Slender Groundhoppers in an area of bare mud but those were the only

insects we found that day. On dull cold days it must be hard for the summer visiting birds to find enough food to survive, never mind to get into breeding condition, which is why they had no time to sing and the bushes were silent. We will go back again when it is warm and sunny and hopefully there will be plenty of birdsong and flowers. On May 8<sup>th</sup> the Church remembers Mother Julian of Norwich. Anchoress and Spiritual Writer, c *1342 -* 1417.
